SÁMI KOTA UPDATE

If you have been to Salolampi in the last 25 years, then you have seen our beautiful Sámi *kota*, located on the road to sauna near the entrance to the *luontopolku*. Sámi are the traditional Indigenous peoples inhabiting the northern part of Finland (Lappi).

The structure was built at Salolampi in 1999. Charlo Mayo, Niilo Ilmari Mattus and his son, worked on its initial construction Ilmari, whose Sámi name is Uccpárnáá Vuoli Ilmar, advocates for Sami language and cultural heritage.

Recently, the kota has deteriorated due to age and weather conditions. However, in summer 2024, a team of volunteers led by Jim and Ruth Pulju and Phil and Katja Zarns, worked to restore the kota for the enjoyment of all Salolampilaiset. The group upgraded the central rock and cement fire ring to a practical grill with a hood that connects to the chimney, ensuring that the smoke rises up and out, as was intended in the building's initial plans.

FALL AT SALOLAMPI

In September 2024, Salolampi held an extended **Fall Adult Weekend**. Adult weekend participants and staff came from seven different states and one province. It was likely the warmest fall program in Salolampi history with temperatures in the mid-80s for most of the weekend. There were lots of opportunities to study Finnish in small-groups with *Tiina*, *Susanna*, and *Helvi* to sing, craft, play games, sauna, and bake.

A simulation of a Finnish *kirpputori*, organized by Susanna, had gently used goods from Finland, new products - like Salolampi Foundation Board Member, Steve Leppälä's "Got viiliä?" shirts, and handknit hats. This simulation, held throughout the weekend, tied in well with Tiina's and Helvi's cultural presentation about their experiences thrifting in Finland. The Juli Wood Quartet was a delightful addition to programming this fall. They performed following the banquet meal and many participants got up to dance to Raatikko.

Later in September, the **Fall 2024 Work Weekend** brought together past villagers, current and past staff, Salolampi Foundation Board members, community members, parents of villagers and staff, and CLV leadership staff. We also had the help of AmeriCorps volunteers. Projects completed include chopping and stacking wood for the lakeside firepit and beach sauna; removing all rocks and cleaning area along the side of the yellow wing flowerbeds; placing; placing new weed barrier landscaping fabric, and continuing restoration of the Sami kota.

ALUMNI PROFILE: PAAVO TAIPALE

For Paavo Taipale (pictured at right with former Board President Aino Wheler), Salolampi is a family affair. I sat down with him to hear how it all started and what his vision for Salolampi now that he is moving.

Tell me about why you came to Salolampi the first time, and what made you want to keep coming back.



My family has been part of Salolampi since the beginning. My father was a counselor, and my grandmother a cook at the first ever sessions of Salolampi. My memories of my first year at Salolampi go back to when the red Kioski, Pankki and Askarteluhuone building was a volleyball court and cabins 4 (Lappi) and 5 (Savo) were not yet built. I remember having a good time at my first two-week session and making some great friends back then. I even had some pen pals for several years (this was the 1990s). To this day I loosely keep in touch with one friend back from my first year at Salolampi. In addition to being a villager, I attended work weekends regularly with my twin sister, Ritva, and my father and grandfather. I remember bringing water to the volunteers erecting Cabins 4 and 5, and I couldn't tell you how many times I have cleaned and washed the benches of the Ranta Sauna.

What's your favorite thing about Salolampi? The people and the sauna!

How did your Salolampi experience change the way you viewed the world? I think growing up speaking Finnish and English at home and almost yearly trips to Finland during my youth has always given me a more worldly view. The experience at Salolampi/CLV expanded that further knowing that there were villages around the lake with others learning French, German, Spanish, Norwegian and other languages. Whether you can speak only a few words of another language or can have a conversation in another language, it garners a level of respect, understanding and acceptance of others.

What did you study in college, and how did you decide on a career? Did your experience at Salolampi influence your career? I studied Aviation Management at the University of North Dakota to become a commercial pilot. The Salolampi experience made me want to be able to travel world, meet people from different places that speak different languages and have had a variety of life experiences. My profession as an airline pilot has afforded me the time and ability to travel all over the world. I have many places to visit yet but I have been fortunate to be able to walk the Great Wall of China on work layover, hike Mount Kilimanjaro with friends on my time off, see Little Blue penguins in New Zealand and of course, a yearly trip to Finland to visit family, friends and great saunas.

You have been on the Salolampi Foundation Board for 21 years (!) What drives your service to Salolampi? I joined the Salolampi Foundation back in 2004 while a student at UND. As a former villager I think I brought a different perspective to the board of largely older retired folks on the board, like my grandfather. I always like going up to the Salolampi site in Bemidji, MN. The location on the shores of Turtle River Lake is just so beautiful. I really enjoyed work weekends and started to lead those weekends for many years. It was just another reason to spend time there and take a sauna! The Salolampi Foundation made a great investment/donation in gifting the Salolampi buildings to CLV. I always felt it was important that we help keep Salolampi looking great and maintain our investment in the upkeep of the physical site for those that attend Salolampi. Children and adults alike will want to come back to a place that keeps looking beautiful. As a third generation board member, I have felt it is very important to maintain a strong organization, mission and legacy so youth are able to attend Salolampi. I also enjoy the people on the board, especially other people I attended Salolampi with, as a villager and as staff. The board members are great individuals and we have worked well together to bring the foundation forward into a stronger position for the future.

Do you have any advice for young people interested in studying Finnish?

Attend Salolampi! Visit Finland, find someone you can converse with and try not to worry about making mistakes!
